### Commissioning principles

- Follow the understand, plan, do and review commissioning cycle
- Work in partnership co-commissioning to achieve best value
- Develop award and monitoring processes proportionate to the contract value
- Ensure service provision is equitable across the county
- Provide victims with seamless pathways of support
- Ensure support services are victim-focused and led and responsive to their needs
- Value local service providers and provide opportunities to co-design services
- Invest in early intervention
