Cambridge United FC deliver football sessions to young males, enabling them to develop their football skills on the pitch, while off the pitch, they discuss how they be influential in changing behaviours towards women and girls. Individuals are asked to make a verbal pledge whereby they make a promise relating to their behaviour towards women and girls, including having the courage to stand up to and/or call out unacceptable views/behaviours. The six-week Pledge Programme will be delivered to six different cohorts of young people from six schools in Cambridge City.	£3,500
